# CONSECRATION OF THE CHURCH & CENTENARY CELEBRATIONS

#### **Preparations**

There were months of preparation leading up to the consecration of St. Vincent's, and in the days before there was a flood of activity to make the final preparations.

Fr. Michael Goldade, two priests and 46 seminarians from St. Thomas Aquinas Seminary in Dillwyn, Virginia arrived in Kansas City on Tuesday night.

On Wednesday the seminarians were busy with setting up the sacristy, practicing the ceremonies, schola practice, setting up for the audio and visual recording of the event, and final cleaning inside and outside of the church and property.

Mrs. Jamerson had been preparing food weeks in advance. She and her volunteer kitchen staff were ready for the meals they would serve to the priests and seminarians over the four days they were in Kansas City.

Sarah Tomac and her crew arranged the flowers for all of the altars and for the tables at the banquet.

Organist Ethan Sestak practiced all summer for the event, and the choir practiced for more than a month which included learning new music.

#### Vigil of the Dedication - Wednesday, September 25

The vigil of the dedication was held at the Convent of Christ the King. Bishop Bernard Fellay gave a thorough description of the ceremony and each of the blessings, all of which can be found in the *Centenary Celebrations and Consecration* book, still available in the vestibule.

• Blessing of Gregorian Water - a mixture of water, wine, salt, and ash as prescribed by Pope

- St. Gregory the Great
- Blessing of the Repositories for the Relics
- Blessing of the altar linens
- Blessing of the crucifix that now hangs above the main altar

The blessings were followed by recitation of Matins of the Martyrs.











#### The Consecration Ceremony - Thursday, September 26

The Consecration of the church by Bishop Fellay began with the:

#### Purification of the Building

The bishop circled the outside of the building and sprinkled it with the Gregorian Water, he then entered the church and sprinkled the interior with the blessed water.

A cross of ash was made in the center of the nave. The bishop, using the tip of the pastoral staff, wrote the alphabets of the Greek and Latin languages, beginning with the Greek.





#### Transfer of the Relics

After the Purification of the church building and a sermon by the bishop, the relics were transferred from the crypt chapel into the church. They were carried on the pier by Fr. Daniel Muscha, pastor, and Fr. Carl Sulzen, Fr. Daniel Dailey and Fr. Joseph

Brauner all of whom attended St. Vincent de Paul.

The relics, three grains of incense and a certificate testifying to the consecration of the church and altar (prepared at the Vigil) were placed into the sepulcher of each altar to be consecrated.



#### Consecration of the Church and Altars

The bishop anointed each of the twelve crosses inscribed on the walls with Holy Chrism. He then anointed the altars and laid blessed incense upon the

center and four corners of each of the altars, and it was set alight.







#### Mass of the Consecration

Mass was offered after the consecration of the church, and was followed by a light reception on the lawn in front of the church.

The ceremony was live streamed for those unable to attend and the video is available on the parish website or on the SSPX News - English YouTube Channel with the various SSPX Podcasts.

I Vespers of the Dedication of Churches was sung later in the day.

Space. They enjoyed a slideshow of the history of St. Vincent's, speeches by Bishop Fellay, Frs. Beck,



# PLENARY INDULGENCES FOR THE POOR SOULS

### SIX GENERAL RULES FOR OBTAINING A PLENARY INDULGENCE

- 1. State of grace at least when performing the indulgenced act
- 2. Complete detachment from sin, even venial sin
- 3. Confession (20 days before or after the indulgenced act)
- 4. Communion (20 days before or after the indulgenced act)
- 5. Prayers for the Supreme Pontiff (20 days before or after the indulgenced act)
- 6. Indulgenced act: a special good work with special conditions of place and time

### INDULGENCED ACTS TO BE PERFORMED FOR OBTAINING A PLENARY INDULGENCE

- From November 1 to 8: visit of a cemetery with mental prayer for the poor souls.
- On November 2: visit of a church or an oratory with one Our Father and one Creed being recited.

A partial indulgence can be obtained any time by visiting a cemetery and praying for the Poor Souls.

The following prayer is especially recommended:

Eternal rest grant to them, O Lord, and let perpetual light shine upon them. May they rest in peace. Amen.
